EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

"GET A KIT"

PUT TOGETHER AN EMERGENCY SUPPLY KIT

In the event of a disaster you will need some basic supplies set aside to last for at least 72 hours. Your emergency supply kit should include canned or dry non-perishable food, a can opener, bottled water, a battery-powered or hand-crank radio, extra flashlights and batteries.

Get a kit for home and keep one in your car and a kit a work.

HOME

- Your disaster supplies kit should contain essential food, water, and supplies for at least three days.
- Keep this kit in a designated place and have it ready in case you have to leave your home quickly. Make sure all family members know where the kit is kept.
- Additionally, you may want to consider having sheltering supplies for up to two weeks and a well stocked pantry with non-perishable food items.
- In case you need to EVACUATE, make sure you have a separate "to-go bag" ready so that you
 are self-sufficient for at least 72 hours. It's a good idea to put your emergency kit in a
 backpack, duffel bag or suitcase with wheels. If you have to evacuate, you can easily bring it
 with you.
- Your "to-go bag" should contain:
 - a. water and non-perishable foods;
 - b. battery operated radio and batteries so you can get important information from local officials;
 - c. First aid kit;
 - d. Flashlight;
 - e. Maps:
 - f. Important documents such as proof residence, pictures of your family including pets, insurance policies, and tax records;
 - g. Comfortable clothing and blankets;
 - h. Unique family needs such as prescription medications, pet supplies, infant supplies or any other unique needs your family may have.

Work

- This kit should be in one container, and ready to "grab and go" in case you are evacuated from your workplace.
- Make sure you have food and water in the kit. Also, be sure to have comfortable walking shoes at your workplace in case an evacuation requires walking long distances.

Car

- o Extra quantities of prescription medications and medical supplies;
- Bedding and clothing, including sleeping bags and pillows;
- Food, bottled water, a battery-operated radio and extra batteries, a first aid kit, a flashlight,
 flares, jumper cables and seasonal supplies;
- Copies of important documents: driver's license, social security card, proof of residence, insurance policies, wills, deeds, birth and marriage certificates, tax records, etc. You may wish to scan the documents and keep them on a key.
